

FEB. 17 MEETING REPORT

The last meeting of the Online Users Group was held at Seven Oaks Hospital with 9 members attending (Judy, Cheryl, Dallas, Bev, Janet, Bernice, Donna, Kathy and me). The planned Search Problem session did not take place as all the time was taken up by announcements and discussion of issues summarized below and updated with more recent information:

BIOSIS CONNECTION is a new online information service to begin in April 1988. Databases include BioMeetings, BioBooks, Forthcoming Events, Biotheses, Aids database, & Bioexpress (current citations). [the Medical Library, U of M, will be signing up and will report more at a later date]

AMA/NET: As reported previously the U of M Medical Library has subscribed and received promotional material to distribute including a MS-DOS disk that demonstrates the system.

GRATEFUL MED 3.0: The latest version of this easy to use software interface to MEDLARS is now out. The program has had significant enhancements and is a serious contender in the end-user database marketplace.

INFOHEALTH: Sharon Allentuck has reported that the Misericordia Hospital has subscribed. The Manitoba Telephone System is marketing InfoHealth and is offening 4 communication packages that include hardware, communications software, line installation and training.

CD-ROM: St. Boniface's Carolyn Sifton Library has finally received their PSYCHINFO and MEDLINE systems from Silver Platter.

Now that several MHLA member libraries have CD-ROM the issue of what policies were in place with regard to doing CD-ROM searches for other MHLA libraries. Although nothing has been firmly established it was felt by some that charges should be applied as possible incentive for other hospital administrations. The policy of the U of M Medical Library has been to treat CD-ROM the same as traditional online searching.

Several CD-ROM cancer databases are commercially available, one from Silver Platter (CANCER-CD), and one from Lippincott (ONCODISC).

Silver Platter will be introducing many of their CD-ROM databases, currently available only on MS-DOS computers, for the Macintosh in mid 1988.

UMSEARCH: St. Boniface Hospital Medical Library now has a microcomputer public access terminal installed to access the Umsearch online catalogue of the University of Manitoba.

Additional public terminals have been set up throughout the University including three in the Medical Library.

OLAM: The U. of M. currently receives a discount of \$10 per hr. on DIALOG searching as a member of OLAM, a consortium under the auspices of CLA. It does not appear that MHLA libraries would be able to take advantage of this service as it

JUNE 16-20, 1988

Preparations are well underway to host the 1988 CLA
Conference at Halifax. A Conference Planning Committee, Convened
by Joan Brown-Hicks, Co-ordinator, Community Services, Halifax
City Regional Library, has been meeting since February 1987.

The theme of the Conference is "Libraries in the Information Marketplace". Dr. William Converse, President of CLA has introduced the theme with a view to exploring the state of the 'information marketplace' which will focus on:

Is there a conflict between libraries' free public service and the marketing of information for profit? Are bibliographic utilities and online commercial data bases replacing librarians?

If the Information Marketplace assumes a profit motive, what will be the impact on society's economically and educationally disadvantaged?

Are more efficient, instant access methods establishing standards which traditional libraries cannot measure up to? How can we run more efficient libraries and continue to make libraries a vital part of Canadian culture? Can libraries survive free trade in the Information Marketplace?

Dian Cohen, a prominent economist and financial editor of CTV news is the theme speaker. Librarians, educators, historians and participants will try to explore this theme during the five days of fun and frolic as well as enrichment of mind and spirit.

The conference site will be the World Trade and Convention Centre, one of the newest and most distinctive landmarks in the heart of downtown Halifax. The Convention Centre offers world class facilities for the delegates, and is connected by an underground walkway to Prince George Hotel, the designated Conference hotel. It is conveniently located and is close to many hotels, shops, restaurants, lounges, bars and other entertainment facilities.

A few of the workshops and sessions, embracing the theme and which should interest most librarians are:

There are meetings with authors, a boat cruise of Halifax Harbour, bus and walking tours of Halifax, tours of Nova Scotia's scenic South Shore and the Annapolis Valley, and a tour of the famous Peggy's Cove. Planned are more than 200 programs, meetings, social functions, tours, as well as informal gatherings which will ensure an action-packed CLA '88.





THE ALZHEIMER'S FAMILY RESOURCE CENTRE

The Alzheimer Society of Manitoba is a voluntary, non-profit organization affiliated with the Alzheimer Society of Canada. Its goals are to promote, provide and encourage Family Support, Eduaction, Research and Advocacy. Its membership consists of families and friends of persons with Alzheimer Disease and related disorders, health and social service professionals, and interested individuals.

Membership (\$15.00 Individual, \$10.00 Senior/Student, \$50.00 Patron Member) entitles a person to receive the Provincial and National Newsletters on a regular basis; access to the Resource Centre Library of books, audio and video tapes; and a variety of support programs, all at no charge.

The Society is responding to the need for family support, information about community resources, and education related to Alzheimer Disease by providing:

- a library of books, journals, newspapers, pamphlets, audio and video tapes
- information kits for families and professionals (\$6.00 each). (A Professional Information Kit is available from MHLA. Contact Hélène Proteau at the Medical Library 788-6462.)
- regular public information meetings
- workshops for caregivers and family members
- community group presentations to inform the public
- in-service education for health care providers
- family support groups for emotional support (available on a regular basis in many areas of Manitoba contact the Centre)
- family visiting by telephone and in person
- a Wanderer's Registry to assist the Winnipeg Police Department and the R.C.M.P. in locating missing patients

--- to copied do . To per page. Atso avaitable, either for use in the library or in the community, are a number of audio and video tapes on Alzheimer's Disease. The rental fee is \$3.00 per tape plus transportation costs from the Society's offices to destination and return. No tapes are sent by mail. The borrower is responsible for damages to/or loss of the tapes. Those in rural Manitoba may either find some materials by contacting the Centre's resource person in their area or come directly to the Society's offices in Winnipeg to borrow material. Nearly all borrowed material can be renewed by telephone.

Manitoba Federation of Labour Occupational Health Resource Centre

The Manitoba Federation of Labour (M.F.L.) established the Occupational Health Centre on April 0,1983 to assist workers in dealing with job-related health issues. The Centre is financially supported by individuals, unions, organizations and the Manitoba Health Services Commission. Providing diagnostic and assessment services, education and information to individuals and groups on a non-profit basis, the Centre is a unique facility.

On staff are occupational health physicians, occupational health nurse practitioners, an occupational hygienist, an executive director and an administrative assistant. Approximately 2,250 patients have received assis

tance in the last five years.

A specialized, on-site resource centre provides the public with an up-to date, broad range of occupational health and safety information. Since ther is no specific staff person to look after the resource centre as a sole responsibility, patrons are encouraged to come in person to utilize the resources. The hours are 9-5, Monday to Friday. The Centre is also open until 8 pm on Wednesdays.

Staff are available to conduct literature searches. Information source on site include the computer data bases of the Canadian Centre for Occupati al Health and Safety in Hamilton. There are many texts available for use.

Print material may be utilized only in the resource centre.


Besides books on the subject of occupational safety and health, the resource centre has a good selection of periodicals ranging from the British Journal of Industrial Medicine to the Occupational Health Nursing Journal to the Scandinavian Journal Journal of Work, Environment and Health. A larg collection of vertical files and government documents is also accessible. There is some study space near this material that may be used to make notes

The M.F.L. Occupational Health Centre occupies the main floor at 98 Sherbrook Street. On the second floor (with entrance at 696 Westminster) is the Manitoba Labour Education Centre. The M.F.L. Occupational Health Centre and the public both have access to the print and the Health and Safety Video collection of the M.L.E.C. This is approximately 64 safety and health related VHS $(\frac{1}{2})$ format videotapes. The topics range from back care to coping with hazardous chemicals. The telephone number of the M.L.E is 772-0423 or 772-4239.

If you are interested in speakers or educational programs concerning health and safety in the workplace, the Centre provides lecturers, workshops


