1991 MHLA Union List of Selected Serials to be published in June

At the Feb 20. general meeting, the membership approved the recommendations of the Union List Committee that, Charley Pennell produce the next edition of the list. The members present voted to provide \$1000.00 to Charley for the production of the list. With the proposal MHLA will have a master list in camera-ready format, a printed copy of each contributor's titles and holdings, the database on diskette, and documentation for producing and formatting the list.

Workshops for the eighteen existing contributors were held in mid-March to discuss details of adding titles and changing The Association's holdings. newest institutional member and newest union list contributor, the company Arcor, will be adding its location to existing titles. Routledge is the librarian responsible for providing information services for Arcor - a company located in Winnipeg's Exchange area that designs and markets aids and devices to promote independent living.

Getting to Know Inmagic

When Deer Lodge Centre Library inherited the Crane Library last spring, we were also fortunate to receive the database management system, Inmagic. In order to share our experience with using Inmagic in our library, I'll break that old rule of etiquette and "look a gift horse in the mouth".

Inmagic has been around since 1980. The latest version, 7.2, was released late last summer with some significant improvements and is priced at approximately \$1200. It has found wide acceptance in law firms and consequently law libraries. This has meant that it is responsive to the unique and idiosyncratic needs of libraries, especially ones operated by the lone overworked librarian. Someone who doesn't really have the time to pour over incomprehensible manuals written by a computer genius who never ventured into a library. The process of adapting a database management system to library functions can be formidable. Inmagic is attractive because someone else has anticipated some of the possible applications and pitfalls. Inmagic also produces BiblioGuide, a kind of cookbook of data structures and reports designed especially for libraries and information centers. It comes in a book format and on disk or tape. The harassed or inexperienced can adapt Biblioguide as is, the structures and reports can be altered or used as examples.

We began by examining the database that the Crane Library in Toronto had set up, mostly familiarizing ourselves with its search capabilities. Boolean searching is available while global searching is not. To search more that one field at a time you must either enter a long search sentence or conduct your search in several steps. You can search for a word or the stem of a word anywhere within a field indexed by keyword. Fields indexed by term can be retrieved by using search relations like "less than", "equal to", "starts with", etc. SearchMagic, a stand alone, searchonly version of Inmagic can also be purchased. Designed for end-users, it is easy to use, and it

protects your database from inadvertent changes.

Once we were comfortable with Inmagic, we set up small sample databases to experiment with. We created databases for serials, acquisitions and cataloguing. While there is flexibility in what you can change after your databases are set up, there are the inevitable surprises. For example, once you have married a database to a data structure it really is " for better or for worse". You can add fields, but only at the end or the beginning of the structure. We plan to transfer records from our acquisition database to our catalogue database once items are received, therefore the fields to be transferred must be identical. There is already a report format in the Inmagic manual which transfers records from database to database. I haven't tried it yet, but it appears straightforward.

Two features of Inmagic we especially appreciated when designing our database structures are its unlimited field lengths and the ability to repeat fields. You don't have to anticipate how long an author field or title field will be and you can assign as many subject headings (authors, corporate authors, etc.) as you like in a single record. Inmagic also gives you a good deal of flexibility in choosing how to index and sort fields. Passwords may be used to restrict and protect databases, or if you are cataloguing both books and journals in the same database, to block out inapplicable fields from the on-screen template.

Once you have created your data structures, building and maintaining databases goes fairly smoothly. When you are in the create mode for entering records you have an on-screen template or form to work with. We created an identical paper form which is filled in by a cataloguer. This makes data entry a task which can be done by someone unfamiliar with cataloguing. One of the new features in version 7.2 is the add function in the Maintain mode. This function allows Inmagic to accept an ASCII text file that is in Inmagic load format. This means you can use a

terminal where you do not have Inmagic to create new records and then load them later. This is useful in an environment where your Inmagic terminal is busy, or where you have satellite libraries adding records.

There are some mysterious things which happen in the maintenance mode. For example you must exit out of Inmagic altogether before you can see what the last access key you entered was. This makes it necessary to keep a good log of what have entered. Also, if you are entering an access key you already have used and you make a mistake, it doesn't tell you that the record exists until you try to save it. Have you ever entered the wrong security code in your banking machine and it doesn't tell you until you've completed the whole transaction? Its like that.

Also new with version 7.2 is the ability to create field defaults. If you are entering several items which share an identical field (i. e. journal title, corporate author) you don't have to retype the field with every new record. Its a nice feature but if you exit out of Inmagic you lose the default unless you save it in an ASCII file.

The sorting abilities of Inmagic allow you to manipulate data in ways that are useful in libraries. The report function allows you to create output for your own use and to impress your users. Its fairly simple to produce a simple report like a subject or author authority file, or a shelf list. BiblioGuide gives you ready made ways to do this. If you are attempting more complex reports, patience and a sense of humour are required.

One of the successful print products we've created so far is a video catalogue. We searched for all records with "video" in the format field and then wrote a report which sorted them by title and subject. Then we sent it to word processing for editing and spiffing up. For you DOSphobes, importing Inmagic files into an ASCII file and then into your wordprocessing package is fairly straightforward.

We have closed our catalogue but we still will be producing a main entry card for the MHLA

catalogue. We adapted a report format which allows us to print a card. Good cataloguers will probably gasp in horror, this not a good little AACR2 rev. card, but it does the trick.

We haven't been alone in getting to know Inmagic. There is an active Inmagic users group in Winnipeg. We have a user support contract from M. E. Phipps (Inmagic distributor in Canada) and, though somewhat expensive, we are satisfied with that. Since October there has been a workshop offered by Phipps and one is coming up next month. Inmagic has its strengths and weaknesses, like any software, or horse.

MHINET Update

As MHINET'S first six months of operation draw to a close, the program is well underway, and utilization statistics point to healthy prospects ahead. Through publication of a regular column and special bibliographies in MARN'S publication Nurscene, registered nurses are regularly reminded of our presence, and we are raising our profile with other eligible users in MHO agencies and facilities throughout Manitoba.

Word of our services spread at the rate of a trickle at first, but after a provice-wide publicity package (consisting of a blurb and three special bibliographies) aimed at MHO facilities, this increased to a deluge. We have had requests from more than 180 individuals so far, involving fifty communities outside of Winnipeg, from Churchill to Pinawa, and Melita to Leaf Rapids. The number of Monthly requests has soared from a low of 37 in October to a high of 104 in March. At the same time, we are fielding Union Book Catalogue and Bridge requests for locations of 43 to 69 items monthly.

Response time has naturally slowed as a result of increased demand, from our early same-day or next-day service to a current median of 4 days. Clients requesting a computer search can now expect to wait a week for the results, but if they indicate an urgent need for the information, their request is detoured past the mainstrean and into

the route for almost-immediate attention.

A second set of bibliographies is currently being distributed to the 240 agencies and facilities of MHO, this time focussing on AIDS. A further publicity push will follow in May or June, when posters advertising our services are sent to these facilities. The latest batch of Special Bibliographies, numbered 4 to 9, is also being forwarded to MHLA facility representatives.

Dialup access to BROWSE, Red River Community College online catalogue, is now available. Detailed instructions are available online as well as printed instructions for searching are available from the library.

Getting in:

Dial into the UofM's Amdahl computer at 275-6100.

Type "CC" at the DevelNet prompt and hit the RETURN key. This prompt reads "Request (enter classname or "help")"

Type "RRCCLIB" at the VTAM prompt and hit the RETURN key. this prompt reads: "Please enter service>"

Type search command.

Search command summary:

- SU Subject search words; e.g., "su small business manitoba"
- TI Title search words; e.g., "ti what color parachute"
- AU Author search words; e.g., "au Farley Mowat"

- ; Used to separate 2 different commands in the same search statement; e.g., "ti people deer; au mowat"
- / Truncate search word; e.g., "nurs/"
- / Eliminate search word; e.g., "economics /home"
- DE Detailed record for the displayed item; e.g., "de 1"
- SE Select resource type (a, b, f, g, p, v); e.g., "se fva"
- CA Search by call number; e.g., "ca hd 69"
- HE Display headings containing the search words; e.g., "he business manitoba"
- LI Display alphabetical list of the headings; e.g., "li Canada"

Getting Out:

Type any of these words and hit the RETURN key: "end", "quit", "exit", "bye", or "off"

Type "/rcl" & hit the RETURN key

Libraries Meet to Plan Interlibrary Loan

On April 11 members of the Manitoba Library Resource Sharing Group met in Winnipeg to plan changes to Manitoba's interlibrary loan system. The Resource Sharing Group, a body representing all types of libraries in Manitoba, agreed in principle to set up a multi-type library consortium to handle various aspects of the interlibrary loan

process.


Pat Bozyk, Librarian at Red River Community College and chair of the Resource Sharing Group, stated that the agreement inprinciple is a first step toward establishing the consortium and that a sub-committee will now draw up a draft agreement for the consideration of Resource Sharing Group members at another meeting in September.

"We are quite excited about the concept", said Bozyk after the meeting. "Consortia have made a big difference to the efficiency of interlibrary lending in a lot of American states and it would be wonderful if we could achieve some of these benfits here in Manitoba."

A presentation on the Minneapolis based Minitex Library Network by that organization's Director, Bill deJong was one of the workshops at the M.L.A. Conference on April 13. Bozyk said that Resource Sharing Group members are interested in looking at Minitex as a model for the Manitoba consortium.

"In the end, whether or not Manitoba libraries want to join the consortium will depend upon the usefulness of the services it offers," said Bozyk. "The planning sub-committee will be looking into the feasability of such things as courier contracts and using the consortium to administer an automated Union List of Serials."

To create national and international recognition of Canada's capabilities in services and business in the field of aging and rehabilitation.

To encourage and assist efforts which enhance the quality of life and maintain the independence of the elderly and persons with disabilities.

INFORMATION AND LIBRARY RESOURCES:

The ARCOR Resource Library is in the developmental stage. The collection will emphasize product literature in the fields of aging and rehabilitation. We are presently entering Canadian distributor information onto a CD-ROM product, Hyperabledata, and organizing product catalogues containing information about assistive devices as well as architectural components in the barrier free design area.

It is estimated that the library will eventually subscribe to as many as 300 journals, newsletters and newspapers, many of which are unique titles to Manitoba.

The book and audio visual collection will

concentrate on the area of technology and aging and rehabilitation and will only number in the 1,000 range. An extensive reprint collection will also be housed.

The library is equipped with a Macintosh IIcx computer linked to a local area network. Extensive use is made of electronic mail and fax transmissions.



Ileitis (or Crohn's disease) and Colitis are two forms of inflammatory bowel disease (IBD). IBD is a painful disease which can and does strike anyone regardless of age, sex or race. It is a chronic and non-contagious disease with no known cause or cure. The Foundation is dedicated to finding the cause and cure for inflammatory bowel disease by funding medical researh and providing educational programs. It also aims to improve the treatment of patients and to provide current IBD information for patients and their families, health professionals and the general public.
