The October meeting in Brandon represents the first joint meeting held between the Manitoba Health Libraries Association and one of CHLA's newest chapters, the Saskatchewan Health Libraries Association. MHLA extends it's warmest welcome to the members of SHLA and hopes this meeting is just the first of several to come. The following is a brief overview and history of SHLA.

The Saskatchewan chapter of the Canadian Health Libraries Association was first visualized in 1988 by the Regina Health Sciences Library Council, a consortium of eight health libraries in Regina, who looked into the feasibility of starting a chapter. Our founding meeting was held on October 19, 1988 in Regina. We started with 14 members and have grown to a present membership of 29.

We hold semi annual meetings, alternating meetings in north and south locations. At each meeting we have two or more information sessions with topics which members have voiced as concerns in their library settings. Our membership consists of large Health Science Libraries down to one person overseeing Health Records and the Library.

One of our projects was dealing with

"Patient Access to Information". We held a panel discussion at our fall meeting and had representation from the legal, ethical viewpoint; medical profession, the public library and one of our members. After this meeting a committee was formed to look into this matter in more depth. Questionnaires were sent out and the information was tallied. Our group then came up with a Policy Statement on this issue.

We have not started any new projects for this year but each meeting brings new challenges and questions from our members.



June 15-19, 1991 Hamilton, Ontario

In June, the CHLA/ABSC 1991 Annual Conference was held in Hamilton. The Hamilton Conference Planning Committee had checked the smallest detail and the five days were filled with inspiration, instruction, ideas, fellowship, technology and a good healthy measure of food.

The Continuing Education offerings were well attended and enthusiastically received. Perhaps the highlight of the CE sessions was the all day workshop led by Dr. Charles McClure, School of Information Science, Syracuse University, on Evaluating Library Services. All Conference participants also had the opportunity to hear Dr. McClure's challenge to evaluate library services during the second Keynote address.

Dr. Geraldine Kenny-Wallace, President McMaster University gave the first Keynote address entitled "New Directions - Science or Art? Science, technology and information management". Dr. Kenny-Wallace compared today's emerging information technologies to the remarkable stained-glass windows found in the 13th century Gothic cathedral at Chartres. Her insight and intelligence provided a remarkable beginning to the conference.

The exhibits were well attended as exhibitors included book, journal and supplies vendors, data base and automation specialists, and book binders. The exhibit area was conveniently located beside the main meeting room and was used for most coffee breaks thus giving us all an added incentive to meet with the vendors and discuss their products.

The social occasions provided us with an opportunity to relax, meet old friends and make new ones. We had an opportunity to visit the Hamilton Art Gallery during the opening reception, and were entertained by The Gents, an accappella ensemble, following the Banquet. Some energetic people even woke up early and went on guided walks through some nearby areas of Hamilton.

The Hamilton Conference was meaningful for the group from Manitoba. First Ada Ducas assumed the position of CHLA/ABSC President at the close of the business meeting. NEWS FROM THE UNION LIST COMMITTEE

The 1991 edition of the MHLA Union List of Selected Serials was mailed in early June. The selling price, as agreed upon at the AGM, is \$40.00 for the eighteen contributing libraries, \$10.00 for subsequent copies for contributors and \$45.00 for non-contributors. Lists are still available for purchase and may be ordered from Bev Brown at the Medical Library (788-6466). Cheques should be made payable to MHLA.

The delay in printing the individual contributors' lists was resolved after some electronic messaging between Winnipeg and St. John's. The lists were printed and distributed in early September.

We are delighted that Greg Wilton has agreed to take on the role of editing the union list. With the database (in disk form) that Charley has sent and the documentation, the Committee is optimistic that the transition will be smooth.

Contributors are reminded that changes to holdings and new titles should be submitted to the Committee Chair for publication in the MHLA News. Libraries are strongly urged to send in changes on an ongoing basis. This will keep the database up-to-date and make the work of publishing the next edition in 1993 that much easier.

PEOPLE . . .

Janice Hollosy (library technician for MHINET), had a baby girl, Jessie Caitlin on August 14th, weighing in at 9 pounds. Janice, Jessie, Steve (dad) and brother Daniel are all well.

Sharon McKenzie, is Janice's Maternity leave replacement. Sharon completed her library tech training at RRCC in 1982. Sharon set up the Communications Branch Library for the City of Winnipeg, and also has experience with the St. Boniface School Division, and the Fort McMurray Regional Hospital Library in Alberta. Sharon has been with MHINET since July 29th.

Congratulations go to Janet Kochan from the Grace Hospital Library for completing her Bachelor of Arts degree. Way to go Janet! MHINET's first year of operation is drawing to a close. It has been one of considerable challenge and interest for us, from coping with the vagaries of our non-climate-controlled office, to juggling the needs and demands of our three sponsoring bodies--the Health Sciences Centre, The Manitoba Health Organizations, and the Manitoba Association of Registered Nurses--and their respective members.

The year has seen the publication or distribution of fourteen special bibliographies, and service to over 275 individuals. While the final count is not complete, statistics indicate that in the course of twelve months, we will have fielded more than 750 requests, most involving multiple information sources. This figure does not include requests we handle for locations through the Union Book Catalogue or Bridge—about 40 items per month.

Following the distribution of MHINET's poster in June, requests form allied health personnel such as social workers, nutritionists and physiotherapists increased noticeably. Topics are as diverse as elder abuse, Lyme disease, diet therapy for Crohn's Disease, resume-writing, backrub procedures, empowerment, workload measurement, flight nursing, confidentiality, dietary fibre, Matrix management, teenage parenting skills, ergonomics and back injuries, developing ambulatory care services and much much more. Computerized literature searches retrieval of information relatively straightforward, but a major challenge is in finding the time to conduct the searches.

As you already know, MHINET is staffed by one full-time professional librarian, and one half-time library technician. Our services are available to all members of MARN, whether their work setting is a personal care home, acute care or an industrial setting, and regardless of their location in the province. Employees of all MHO facilities and agencies are also eligible to use MHINET. Within this broad mandate, our primary focus is to provide outreach service to areas without access to health information. We encourage

clientele to approach resources in their facility or community first, but where these fail or are lacking we are pleased to "step into the breach" and province the information service required.

On initial contact with MHINET, patrons might have a journal article or book title in mind, but most frequently they request a literature search on a particular subject. Generally within two weeks(sooner if the need is urgent), the patron receives a list of resources and can request items from it by telephone, fax or mail. Materials housed in the Health Sciences Centre Library are normally sent out within a week to ten days. In times of a crunch, turnaround time is a bit longer.

About 2/3 of our book and journal article requests are filled through the Health Science Centre's holding. The number of interlibrary loan requests varies, but averages around 50 per month-roughly the same as the number of computerized literature searches conducted monthly.

It has taken a while to sort out MHINET's place in the health libraries scheme in Manitoba, but I feel fairly comfortable now in saying that I think we have found our niche. The hope is that our presence has taken the heat off some overtaxed resources and that the end result has been a "payoff" for MHLA library workers—in the form of backup, raised awareness of the need for information services, the Union Book Catalogue checking service, our occasional 'Special Bibliographies', and computerized literature searches for those facilities without access to databases.

For the present, it's back to the fray (24 outstanding search requests await), and I look forward to the Brandon meeting.

The Impact of the Hospital Library

In a recently completed scientific study, 97% of the 208 participating physicians said that information provided by their hospital library contributed to better informed clinical decisions. A combination of 15 urban and rural hospitals in the Rochester, New York area took part in the study.

As a result of the information provided by the library, 80% of the physicians said that they handled some aspect of the care of their patients differently than they would have handled it otherwise.

The following changes in specific aspects of patient care were reported by the physicians as a result of the information provided by the library:

Per cent of physicians reporting change

Diagnosis	29%
Choice of tests	51%
Choice of drugs	45%
Reduced length of hospital stay	19%
Changed advice given to the patient	72%

Physicians also said that the information provided by the library contributed to their ability to avoid the following:

Per cent of physicians reporting ability to avoid

Hospital admission		12%
Patient mortality	<i></i>	19%
Hospital acquired infection		8%
Surgery		21%
Additional tests or procedures		49%
Additional outpatient visits		26%

On average, physicians rated the information provided by the library more highly than other information sources such as diagnostic imaging, lab tests and discussions with colleagues.

The study was funded by the Hospital Library Services Program which is administered in the Rochester area by the Rochester Regional Library Council. An additional Research and Development Grant was received from the Medical Library Association. The study received the support of the Medical Society of the County of Monroe and the Seventh District of the Medical Society of the State of New York.

Research achievements include open heart surgery, the pacemaker, heart by-pass operations, valve replacements, antibiotics, and new life saving drugs.
