

The Brandon General Hospital Library is located on the main floor of the Nurses Residence building. It contains approximately 6800 books, has current subscriptions for over 200 journals and houses an audiovisual software collection of approximately 450 titles.

The library staff is dedicated to providing and facilitating access to health and related information resources for all customers in the Brandon community and regional referral area/

The library provides a variety of services including: photocopying, interlibrary loans, literature searches/reference requests, audiovisual hardware loans, maintenance of several pamphlet racks throughout the facility and management of the BGH Archives. The Library recently received a grant approval

from the Brandon General Hospital Foundation for computerization. Installation of the new computers with Internet access, is expected to be completed by September 1, 1998. ( Continued. page 15)



Journal Listings from SERHOLD

CISTI has received the Canadian SERHOLD file from NLM and is now working on creating and printing each library's journal holdings list. Lists will be mailed beginning in mid-April. Included with the mailing will be a printout of each library's DOCUSER profile and instructions for updating it. The regional consortia listings will be printed after the individual library lists.

There is still time for those interested in a regional list to request one. The cost for one copy of a regional union list is \$50.00.

#### DOCLINE Manual

NLM has completely revised the Manual and made it available on the web at http://www.nlm.nih.gov/psd/cas/docline/contents.html.

Libraries should replace their existing manuals with this new version. The updated information describes the current hours of operation, the new prompts in BORROW and LEND, the MEDLARS databases that are linked to DOCLINE and NLM's REFER ON service (chapter 15). Contact the DOCLINE Coordinator if you need a copy.

\* DOCLINE Request Numbers
The DOCLINE request number has 14 characters. The first three characters are the SERHOLD code of the library placing

the request. The fourth character is a hyphen, which must be included any time the request is entered in DOCLINE. The next six characters indicate the date the request was created, in the format YR-MO-DAY. The last four digits are assigned sequentially by DOCLINE. Because the system has only these final four digits with which to provide a unique number to each request, the letters A,B, C, D or E may appear. The 1000th DOCLINE request for any day ends with A000. The 2000th request is B000, and so By using these letters as part of the numbering DOCLINE can accommodate as many as 27,000 requests in a day and still use only four digits to uniquely number each request.

### CISTI Document Delivery Prices

On April 1, 1998, CISTI document delivery prices for Direct Supply service have increased. For orders received and sent electronically, the price has changed from \$8.00 to \$9.00 per article. For orders received non-electronically or those sent by courier, the price has increased from \$11.00 to \$12.00. DOCLINE users that receive CISTI documents via fax or Ariel qualify for the \$9.00 rate.

Also please note that CISTI's stand-alone search service has been discontinued.

Remember that how you receive documents and messages from CISTI depends on how you are registered as a CISTI document delivery client. You can change your CISTI account any time using the web form at http://www.nrc.ca/cisti/register.html.
