



## **DOCLINE TRIAL IN THE MEDICAL LIBRARY**

The spring 1994 issue of the MHLA News contained a brief overview of DOCLINE, the interlibrary loan system developed by the National Library of Medicine for use in health libraries in the United States. Within the past year, DOCLINE has been in place in a large number of libraries in British Columbia. Interest in the system has grown rapidly across Canada.

### **DOCLINE Trial in Western Canada**

In an effort to explore the feasibility of using DOCLINE for interlibrary loan, directors of the academic health libraries in B.C., Alberta and Manitoba agreed in April to undertake a three month trial of DOCLINE. For the months of June, July and August, the libraries agreed to use DOCLINE in requesting journal articles from each other. Requests would be filled within 48 hrs and there would be no charges levied for the trial period. Libraries agreed to send twenty requests per week. One library transmitted articles via fax, while the other three used ARIEL workstations (a computer with an attached scanner which sends scanned pages over the Internet).

### **Results**

Full results and a final report have not yet been compiled. What follows is a summation of

findings and general impressions from the Medical Library. Thanks go to Ruth Holmberg, the library's ILL assistant, for her data and comments.

The Medical Library requested 238 journal articles over the fourteen week period. For the same time period we filled 149 requests. These figures should not be interpreted to mean that the Medical Library is a large net borrower among the academic libraries (although this may be part of the explanation). A more immediate explanation is that one or more of the libraries did not place twenty requests per week.

We were able to fill the majority of items within 48 hrs. Our longest delay was 3 days. There was greater variation in the service we received from other libraries. Items that we requested arrived anywhere from the same day to 9 days. However, the majority were received within the target time of 48 hrs.

**What worked well**

Many of the reported strengths of DOCLINE were confirmed during the trial period. DOCLINE is not a difficult system to learn or to use. Requests can be sent simply by typing the citation number (AN) from MEDLINE plus library mailing information. Requests then route automatically. The system will also randomly distribute requests so that one library does not receive a large number on any one day. If the first library cannot provide the item or does not respond to the request within 24 hrs, the request will then route automatically to another library.

There is no charge for accessing DOCLINE and though the system is very heavily used, there was never a problem in connecting. As with all NLM databases, DOCLINE does not operate on American holidays.

**What worked less well**

For DOCLINE to work well, the titles and holdings information for each library must be accurate. It was known before the trial began that the data in SERLINE and SERHOLD (the NLM databases which DOCLINE accesses) had a large number of gaps and errors.\* The number of misdirected requests would have been much greater but for the fact that DOCLINE has an override function that allows the user to request an item from a particular library, even if the holdings are not correct in SERHOLD.

Typing the AN number instead of the full citation allows requests to be sent quickly. Unfortunately,

NLM requires anywhere from one month to one year to index journal issues for MEDLINE. If the full citation must be typed (as is the case with many requests for 1994 journal articles), an ILL request cannot be sent any faster on DOCLINE than it would be on most other systems.

Codes are used in DOCLINE to indicate why a request could not be filled. Though this allows you to send a response quickly, there were occasions when a free text field would be helpful. Envoy messages were sometimes sent to provide a fuller explanation.

Another problem not inherent to DOCLINE but one which has a major impact on ILL is the interface with AVISO. The academic libraries in Canada have agreed to use AVISO as their ILL management package. Though ISM, the current owner of AVISO, has committed to providing an interface between its software and DOCLINE, it does not currently exist. DOCLINE data must be manually entered into AVISO.

**The Future**

The directors of the four libraries will be evaluating the trial results. And though the trial has ended, the Medical Library continues to receive requests via DOCLINE from hospitals in B.C. and Edmonton. Within the coming months, hospital libraries in southern Alberta will also be DOCLINE participants.

CISTI has also provided support for DOCLINE development. CISTI undertook a special project, funded largely by the academic medical libraries, to assign TCNs (title control numbers) to many more titles in the CISTI Union database. The completion of this project will facilitate the participation of more libraries in DOCLINE.

At the CHLA/ABSC London Conference in June, the membership approved the creation of a Task Force on Resource Sharing that will examine issues surrounding shared resources and document delivery. It is expected that this Task Force will

identify ways for the association to encourage, organize and support resource sharing at the national level.

\* The Medical Library has just completed an in-house project to correct titles and holdings information in CISTI's UNION database. The result of this will be that our holdings information in DOCLINE will also be more accurate.

Christa F.B. Hoffmann, Head, Cataloguing Section, NLM, reports that the 5th edition of the NLM Classification is expected to be published in December, 1994. The U.S. Government Printing Office (G.P.O.) will once again be its distributor. At present pricing information is not available. NLM does not anticipate to make its Classification available in an electronic format in the near future.

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### ROMULUS 2

The second version of Romulus, the CD-ROM system for inter-library loans, has been completely updated and includes many of the new features that Romulus users requested.

You can now use Romulus to create document orders and send them to CISTI and the National Library of Canada through your Internet connecton - the least expensive method. The new version is compatible with all CD-ROM networking platforms.

## VALLEY MEDICAL NETWORK

The Valley Medical Network consortium has voted to discontinue their reciprocal agreement with MHLA for free interlibrary loans. Some VMN libraries may still provide interlibrary loans, but it will be necessary for Manitoba libraries to contact them directly to work out the details.

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## NEW DATABASE AT NLM

A new online database has been added to the National Library of Medicine's international online network. HSTAR (Health Services/Technology Assessment Research) now provides access to the published literature of health services research.

HSTAR is unusual among NLM databases in that it contains not only selected pertinent references and abstracts from MEDLINE and several other NLM databases, but references to government reports, books, book chapters, meeting abstracts, and newspaper articles. Most of the literature cited is from 1985 to the present. It contains 1.3 million records and is updated weekly.

HSTAR was developed by the National Library of Medicine in cooperation with the Agency for Health Care Policy and Research as part of the Library's recent mandate from the Congress to expand its information services in such areas as health services research methods, technology assessment, clinical practice guidelines, health care delivery systems, financing, evaluation, planning, and quality assurance. The Agency will continue to contribute research report, clinical practice guidelines, and other categories to the database.

HSTAR is available under the same conditions as MEDLINE and most of the other NLM databases, that is, at about \$18 per connect hour. It may be

accessed using the Library's Grateful Med software for IBM-PC and Macintosh microcomputers. The cost of an average HSTAR search using Grateful Med is about \$1.25.

## UNCOVER REVEAL

UnCover Reveal, a table of contents alert service delivered through electronic mail, was released by the UnCover Company in early April. Users who have created an UnCover profile that includes their e-mail address and Fax number may select a list of journal titles in which they are interested. When the next issue of any of those titles is entered into the UnCover database, the table of contents is automatically e-mailed to them. Ordering an article through UnCover Reveal is as easy as replying to the e-mail message.

The e-mail table of contents alert service is free. Articles ordered by reply e-mail will be delivered by Fax for a service charge of \$8.50 U.S. plus copyright fee, and a Fax surcharge outside of the U.S. or Canada.

UnCover is a database that provides table of contents indexing from nearly 17,000 journals in all disciplines. Copies of articles from the titles included may be ordered through the database for delivery via Fax. The UnCover database may be accessed through the Internet by telnetting to database.carl.org, or by dial-up at 303/756-3600. There is no charge for searching the database and no login is needed.

### JILL BROWN RECEIVES MHLA LIFE MEMBERSHIP

*The following letter was sent to the Executive of MHLA to nominate Jill for a Life Membership.*

In accordance with Article 4 of the MHLA Constitution, we wish to nominate Jill Brown for Honourary Life Membership in the Manitoba Health Libraries Association.

Jill's interest in the possibilities of a health library association was apparent with her attendance at an informal meeting of representatives from various health-related libraries in May 1974, before MHLA was formed. Once the Association got underway, Jill was there as a charter member, attending the opening meeting in October 1976.

IN May of 1978, Jill was named Vice-President for the 1978/79 term, and continued in this capacity through 1979/80. During her tenure, she acted as Chair (1978/79) and as member (1979/80) of the Programme Committee, and gave a presentation on audiovisual materials in a session entitled "Shared Services in Manitoba Health Libraries: What is Possible?" held at the Winter 1980 meeting. Jill's commitment to information- and resource-sharing was carried through in her participation in Core List Committees in 1978 and 1981. She contributed her expertise in compiling the list for Allied Health in 1978, and Nursing in 1981.

Jill continued her active commitment to the Association well beyond her terms as member of the Executive. She served on the Union Book Catalogue Committee in 1982/83, was editor of the MHLA News in 1983/84 and 1984/85, was a member of the new Online Users Group in 1987, served on the Programme Committee in 1987/88, led discussion on Card Catalogue Production at the Fall 1987 meeting, and co-chaired the Serials Holdings Committee in 1988/89.

While added demands at work prevented Jill from maintaining this level of involvement with the organization, her commitment to excellence, and enthusiasm in serving the Association is evident in minutes from past meetings. In the Fall meeting of 1983, Jill was complimented on her work as editor of the MHLA News, in particular for introducing a new format; this commendation was repeated at the Winter 1984 meeting. The Serials Holdings Committee meeting minutes for Fall 1988 report that when asked if she would consider co-chairing the committee, Jill "accepted with no hesitation!"

These commentaries illustrate the dedication and vigour with which Jill approached her work in the Association, and we ask that the Executive Committee consider a formal commendation with the award of Honourary Life Membership.

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### **MHLA PRESENTS ITS COMMENDATION FOR OUTSTANDING LIBRARY SERVICE TO JUDY INGLIS**

Judy has been a dedicated active member of MHLA for a decade and more, assuming at various times the position of President, New Editor, MHLA Planner, Program Planner, Task Force Chair and others. She has always been willing to volunteer for one more role and performed each and every with aplomb.

Judy came to Manitoba to be the second Extension Librarian serving rural physicians under the auspices of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Manitoba and the Medical Library of the University of Manitoba, so from the beginning she gained the broad view of the need for services in all of the province.

Upon her return to Manitoba after a brief sojourn to Saskatchewan, Judy pioneered the Winnipeg Health Information Network, a project funded by the Winnipeg Foundation. Through this trial project focused on Winnipeg, it service in many ways as the model for the future MHINET service, especially in its effort to reach all health professionals in the member institutions with adequate information service.

Although WHINET funding lapsed, Judy has continued to bring her experience with these outreach services to her role as an advisor to MHINET and has served as a member of the MHINET Board of Directors since its inception.

Judy accepted the challenge of directing the transition of Library Services at the Deer Lodge Centre during the evolution of that institution from a Federally funded Veteran's hospital to a provincially funded geriatric speciality centre. As a result of her vision and zeal, the library became an innovative, entrepreneurial geriatric information provider, developing links especially with personal care homes and geriatric specialists. A further innovation was to contract services with the Winnipeg Municipal Hospitals (now Riverview Health Centre), preventing expensive duplication of resources in the city.

Judy spearheaded the successful application to bring the J.W. Crane Memorial Library collection from Toronto to Winnipeg, housing this comprehensive gerontology resource at Deer Lodge. This achievement gained national attention for her institution and established Deer Lodge as a leader in the provision of geriatric care.

On behalf of MHLA, Judy accepted the task of

co-chairing the 1992 CHLA Annual Conference which met in Winnipeg. The conference brought distinction to our Association and gained recognition to Judy's skills nationally. As a result, she was offered the daunting task of participating in the development of new standards for hospital libraries while service as the CHLA/CCHFA liaison. Her work in this area will guide hospital libraries into the next century.

Judy as the respect and esteem of her MHLA colleagues as a result of her considerable professional achievements, but also our appreciation for her special ability to become our communicator when confusion reigns, our catalyst for change when it is required and our conscience when it counts. Therefore, we of MHLA honour her service by the presentation of this Commendation for Outstanding Service.

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### **MERGER OF ST. BONIFACE GENERAL HOSPITAL LIBRARIES**

In August 1994 the main library services of St. Boniface General Hospital were centralized in one facility. The nursing collection housed in the Helene Fuld Library was relocated to the larger space of the Carolyn Sifton Library in the Research Centre. The new *Bibliothèque Carolyn Sifton-Helene Fuld Library*, as it is officially called, is the central information resource for the entire SBGH community, providing a core collection of health sciences materials, improved access to electronic information sources and document delivery, and a service-oriented staff. A small patients' library continues to provide its own specialized services.

As one of many restructuring and cost-saving initiatives at St. Boniface Hospital, the consolidation of library services under the direction of the new Head Librarian, Mark

Rabnett, is the end result of months of planning. A commercial firm was hired to move the large nursing collection from one end of the hospital complex to the other. A detailed map of the desired layout of the new library was prepared. Every shelf in both libraries had to be carefully labelled to allow the movers to restore library materials in their original order. Before anything could be moved out of the Helene Fuld Library, the entire contents of the Carolyn Sifton stacks had to be relocated in order to free up space for the incoming materials. The move took seven days, involving the usual dust, noise and disruption. Library staff were on duty during the move and continued to provide assistance with reference queries, literature searches, and document delivery requests.

Once the nursing collection had been removed, the former Helene Fuld Library space was transformed into a 24-hour study area for nursing and medical students. This new facility will complement the 24-hour computer lab that has been in operation for a number of years. Audio-visual facilities have also been provided in the study area for the use of students. Located on the second floor of the Nursing Education Building, it will be a valuable resource for nursing students who need after-hours access to a quiet place to read, write and prepare for exams.

For library staff the merger of the two libraries was only the beginning of the reorganization of services. Differing policies, procedures and staff responsibilities had to be rethought, revamped and coordinated. Technical services routines in the two former libraries varied greatly. Public services also reflected different clienteles, different priorities, and different attitudes to service. There were technical problems involved with computer setups, networking workstations, and revisions to the library's configuration of Bridge, the automated system. Hospital restructuring also meant the deletion of two clerical positions and a reduction in the hours of another part-time staffperson. The staff complement is now 4.5 support staff and one

librarian.

The merger of the SBGH libraries comes at a time of growing demand for library services. In addition to the medical students, hospital staff and researchers who make heavy use of the library, the number of baccalaureate nursing students studying at St. Boniface General Hospital has tripled in the past year. The beginning of the academic year brought an enormous increase in activity on all fronts. Although it will take many more weeks to bring the SBGH library reorganization to a successful completion, significant progress has been made, with a minimum of disruption to library patrons.

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#### **PILOT PROJECT TESTS INTERNET-BASED SYSTEM FOR ACCESSING GOVERNMENT INFORMATION**

OTTAWA, May 19, 1994 Industry Minister John Manley today announced the launch of a pilot project to evaluate an Internet-based service for informing Canadians about the workings of Canada's federal government.

"The Open Government Pilot represents an important step in making government information, officials and Members of Parliament more accessible to Canadians and others by using networks such as the Internet," said Mr. Manley. "The project will enable us to develop and test methods for using the information highway to inform and educate the public about government".

The Open Government Pilot provides access to various segments of the federal government including: the House of Commons, the Senate, the Supreme Court, and federal departments and agencies. Intended to be an information tool, it is available in a variety of formats over the global Internet, however, it has been designed to take advantage of a multimedia, hypertext application called World-Wide-Web.

The Open Government Pilot is accessible over the Internet at several sites including the Industry Canada host site, the Universities of New Brunswick, Montreal, Calgary, and British Columbia and the Canadian Centre for Inland Water (Environment Canada). It will also be available at the Helsinki Public Library in Finland and interest has been expressed in hosting the Pilot at the University of Lausanne in Switzerland.

Internet is a global system of networks consisting of approximately 10,000 interconnected networks and serves over 30 million users in 152 countries. There are approximately one million users in Canada.
